Important Reminders

Getting Ready for Acreage Reporting:

July 16, 2018 is the Acreage Reporting Date for most spring crops. The deadline for entering your data is August 10, 2018.

The insured is required to report 100 percent of their acres by CLU for 2018. This means that the Acreage Report that the insured signs is required to list the complete legal, down to the Farm Serial Number/Tract/Field Number.

It is highly recommended that the grower provide their source documents, such as FSA-578s or precision planting records, when completing their acreage report. This will not only ensure that acreage totals match, but it may also prevent delays, and possible issues, at claim time.

Reminder: Acreage Reporting and Replant Payments

As a reminder, a replant claim cannot be paid until the acreage report is processed. As soon as you get the acreage report processed on any policy with a pending replant claim, please let your underwriter know so that we can get the claim paid as soon as possible.

Hail 2018:

Hail Manuals for 2018 can be found in the system under Forms & Docs>View Forms and Documents under the Manuals tab. The Crop Hail tab contains blank and fillable versions of all crop hail applications available for 2018. Please remember to attach the hail applications to the policy within seven days.

Reminder: If there is prior damage on a field, coverage will not attach until an inspection has been completed and we have communicated acceptance to you. Please let your underwriter know immediately about the prior damage, and we will get an inspection opened.

Fall MPCI & Private Product Billing

It's that time of year again. The AmTrust Ag Accounting team wants to remind you of the following:

2018RY Fall MPCI Policies

The first billing of 2018RY Fall MPCI policies were generated on July 1, 2018. Bills will be generated the 1st of each subsequent month until the policies are paid in full. Interest will begin to attach on August 1, 2018, and continue to attach monthly on unpaid premium and fees.

2018 Private Product Policies

To allow as much time as possible for policies eligible for early-payment discounts, we have begun billing ones that have been released by the Underwriting Department. We are routinely monitoring for the addition of new policies.

Early-Payment Discount Due Dates

- Idaho Not eligible
- lowa All payments must have been postmarked by July 1, 2018, to qualify for the discount.
- North Dakota All payments must be postmarked by July 15, 2018, to qualify for the discount.
- All Other States Standalone hail policy payments must be postmarked by July 31, 2018, and all other policies (excluding SRC) by August 31, 2018.
